President's Report

Objectives

Earlier in the year I stated I had 3 Objectives for the club.

Grow the Club

We must actively seek new members for our club to ensure the club has a future.

We need to look at and review our purpose and objectives. We may need to change some of our rules, and our activities to encourage new people to come try us out.

We get out there and let people know who we are and what we are about us.

We must be more active with our social media, start reaching out to potential new members. Those who do come to try us, we must embrace them and bring them into our fold.

Acquire a Club Camp Ground.

A camp ground. My vision:

A low cost option for our members to use for rallies for school holidays for public holidays. Perhaps a solution for our storage issues.

Make it available to other clubs to help fund its maintenance and development. A place of our own.

We once had a camp ground of our own, we occupied it for many many years it was a low cost camp ground we used it for rallies and school holidays during the year. The money we made from it went into our coffers and funded a lot of things for this club. It was Blairgowrie.

We have a lot of work to do before we know if this is achievable.

Work with Cameron's Bight Foreshore Committee toward a new Agreement,

hopefully to continue access to the camp ground for our current and future members.

Membership

This year is the first time our club has managed its own membership fees.

A request to pay went out in the Winter edition of our newsletter a reminder is in the current newsletter. Members have 3 months to pay their renewal fees.

At the time of sending out the newsletters we had 243 recorded as members.

Heather McTaggart and John Stone have worked together in the collection, reconciliation of the money and renewal forms. Heather is in the process of recording all the information we are collecting.

We now have a definitive list of members, their contact details and emergency contact information. This is a great thing.

At the last count we have 160+ financial members.

Rallies

This year we tried something different, we held alternate Rally weekends for Easter and the Melbourne Cup Weekend.

My understanding of this was to try to avoid the traffic, the higher costs associated public holiday weekends and overcome the difficulty to find suitable caravan parks for these periods.

We started with Div. 1 holding a rally the weekend before Easter and the other Divisions continuing with the Easter weekend, Division 5 did different. Division 2 changed their rally from the Easter weekend to the weekend prior because of the cost. This did not work out the way they envisaged as it was still school holidays.

Cup Weekend Divisions 2, 3 and 4 held their rallies while Div. 1 and 5 held theirs the following weekend.

Were they a success? We have not looked at it yet.

At the time of agreeing to the dates for the 2020 calendar we had not experienced the alternate weekends so we decided to do the same again. I will be interested to hear of any feedback.

There has been discussion regarding the number of members attending Rallies. On some occasions Divisions have struggled to get members to attend on other occasions we have fully booked out a park. Next year we will be looking at what we can do to overcome this.

Cameron's Bight

Our 2018/19 season at Cameron's Bight started a little bumpy. Camp Site boundaries were changed to meet the White Cliffs Committee's obligations to meet CFA requirements. Some of the changes made it difficult for some but better for others.

We meet with WhiteCliffs to Cameron's Bight Foreshore Reserve Committee members to discuss and try to resolve some of the issues we had. The foreshore committee indicated they want to work with us to our mutual benefit.

Our Social Activities continued thanks to our great band of willing helpers Anne Cecil leading the way. Thanks to Bob Anderson and his able assistances for continuing to run our Bocce.

This year the Rangers have done a lot of ground work. A large amount of the area we occupy has been raised and levelled, grass planted, taps have been moved, their new office was built and I believe the BBQ is in place. The sites have been re numbered to align with Tyron and Stringers Road Campgrounds. The Screen has gone, we are not aware of the story behind that yet.

We must be mindful that we do not have control over the grounds the White Cliffs to Cameron's Bight Foreshore Reserve Committee are the custodians. We must abide by their rules and live with their changes.

We have a better chance of getting another agreement if we are working in harmony with them.

In the meantime, if your camping there make the most of it, you are occupying a prime piece of real estate, enjoy it.

Learmonth

At the Special General Meeting in 2018 2 motions were put up.

- 1. That the land at Learmonth owned by the RACV Caravan Club of Vic Inc be sold for the purpose of part 2 of this two-part motion. This motion was carried.
- 2. That the proceeds from the sale be used to purchase a Club facility for a meeting place and storage of Club equipment and records. This motion was amended.

The meeting voted to amend the motion to the following:

3. "That within two years of the sale of the land, the Executive will present a minimum of two (2) proposals for use of the funds." This motion was carried.

Earlier this year our property at Learmonth was put on the market.

We have had 3 offers. The first was withdrawn after the potential purchaser had a telephone conversation with the council. They were informed that they could not build on the land. The second offer contained special conditions that we rejected. The same vendor has come back with a new offer minus the conditions we rejected.

The current offer on the table is for \$330,000 with a deposit of 5% \$16,500 on the signing of Contract

Balance Within 30 days of satisfaction of special conditions 26 & 27

Special Condition 26 – Subject to sale of purchasers property by the 3rd of March, 2020 Special Condition 27 – Planning Permit date 3rd of March, 2020.

We have accepted this offer but not signed a contract yet. We shall see how this goes.

To satisfy the 2nd motion we established a Sub Committee made up of representatives from each Division, the President, Secretary and Treasurer.

The key criteria: It must deliver a benefit to the club and not become a financial burden. We have held several meetings, proposed some options, discussed what could be done and how.

Our representatives have engaged with their divisional members seeking suggestions on the direction we should go.

3 options are being investigated

- 1) Lease a Storage Facility Store Equipment and archives
- 2) Purchase a Factory/Storage Facility Store Equipment and archives
- 3) Purchase Camp Ground Low cost camping for members Store trailer, Club Equipment and Archives.

Once the land is sold and we have the information necessary for the options we shall present them.

Special thanks to the Executive and Sub Committee for their ongoing work on these investigations

Going forward-

I will use some words from another member "the club is not broken". It is in a good state. But for this to continue we need to take a careful look at where we are today and where we want the club to go for the future. Things are changing we need to move with them. Social media is one of the ways, thank you to those for their likes on our Facebook page.

We will start to address this next year, you will all be asked to contribute.


