We all gathered for happy hour and had an enjoyable time getting to know one another before heading off to a local Thai restaurant for dinner. After dinner we headed back to camp and retired for the night ready for the Tag-a-Long rally that started the next day.

### **BROKEN HILL**

The Division-5 October rally was held at Myrtleford followed by a Tag-a-Long trip to Broken Hill via Cobar. 3 caravans headed off on Sunday morning.

### DAY 1

Sunday our designation was Jerilderie NSW, we left Myrtleford and headed via Wangaratta to Tungamah for our first stop. We visited the painted silo which depicted local bird life then walked down the main street taking in wall murals and the town war memorial. We left Tungamah and headed to Katamatite for lunch around midday. After a nice break we and stopped at Tocumwal to look at the Murray River, which was running high on the banks. We arrived at Jerilderie about 3pm and stayed at the Jerilderie Motel and Caravan Park, we were on drive though sites and quickly set up for the afternoon. The weather was warm, some went into town for supplies before happy hour at 4:30.

We all gather and sat around for a couple hours before making diner and retiring for the evening.

### DAY 2

Monday our destination was a free camping spot on the Laughlin River 30 klms north of Hillston. We left Jerilderie and headed on the Kidman Way to our first stop at Coleambilly, a town established in 1968. Located in the local park is a "Bucyrus Erie Class 111 Dragline" which was used to excavate the main channels in the Murray Valley and Coleambilly area. The machine was one of four imported from the USA in 1935 and operated up until 1978 when it was placed in the park. The dragline is still in full working order. We then headed off to Griffith and visited the look out and Hermits Cave. After exploring the area we headed back into town for lunch and a walk around town. We continued toward Hillston and our camping spot at Lachlan River Camparound, Wallanthev, The Lachlan River was running very high and fast so we parked back from the river. We had happy hour and diner together before retiring for the evening.

Tuesday we woke to find that the Laughlin River had slowly risen overnight and although we were quite safe water was gathering under Gay and Michaels caravan, we continued along the Kidman Way to our destination at Cobar. We arrived at Cobar about 12:30 and headed to our accommodation at Cobar Caravan Park. After lunch we headed off to take in the sights around town, we visited the Information Centre, Miners Memorial, Devil Rock and Fort Bourke Lookout with views of the open cut mine then headed back to camp for dinner and card games. Gay taught us a new card game called "PIG" which was great fun.

### **DAY 4 & 5**

(Wed & Th) During our time at Cobar we visited the "The Great Cobar Museum" which detailed history of Cobar and its mining, "Devils Rock" which the aboriginals believe to be an evil place and Fort Bourke Lookout that overlooked the open cut mine and provided great views over Cobar.

### DAY 6

Friday we headed off to Topar Service Station for our overnight stop travelling on the Barrier Hwy. We broke camp and the weather started to turn bad with rain for a few hours of driving. We free camped at the service station in a dirt area, Michael luckily didn't get bogged in a damp spot and was able to back out. We headed over to the pub attached to the servo for an enjoyable afternoon having a chat over some drinks and dinner.





Saturday we had a late start relaxing and having a coffee at the servo before departing Topar for Broken Hill, a short drive of 80k. Arriving about 12:30 we set up camp, had lunch and went out to do some sight-seeing. Anne had been given a list of must-see attractions by a friend; on the list was the "The Big Picture" so this became our first stop. The creator of the Big Picture is Peter Anderson and it took him 2 years to paint the 360 degree canvas of landmarks from around Broken Hill which was amazing and well worth the visit. We then headed back to camp for happy hour and enjoyed a chat before retiring for the night.

### DAY 8

Sunday was a big day, we went for a trip to Menindee Lakes. With the recent rains the Darling River was running very high, and the lakes were completely full. We had a guick look around town before going to lunch at Maidens Hotel. We then drove out to the lakes and visited the "Menindee Lakes Dam Wall" to view waters feeding the lake. Following this we headed back to Broken Hill and went to "Bells Milk Bar", apparently the oldest running milk bar in Australia, they make great milk shakes and have a small museum that reflected 50 to 60's era kitchen. After our refreshments we headed off to "Junction Mine". The mine closed in 1972 but its structure is predominately intact and provided an insight to the workings of the mine, it also had a good view over the town. From here we headed to the lookout in town. looked at the "Line of Lode Miners Memorial", the "Big Bench" and took in the view over Broken Hill. As it was happy hour time we headed off to the "Palace Hotel" for a drink and take in where part of Pricilla Queen of the Desert was filmed. As it was clear sky's we headed out to the "Broken Hill Sculptures" and watched the sunset and changing colours on the rock sculpture's. Absolutely amazing and worth the visit. We then headed back to camp for dinner and a rest.

Monday we headed out to Silverton about 30klms from Broken Hill. We had a drive around town, stopped at an art gallery, had lunch at the Silverton Hotel, visited the Goal museum which had a lot of local history and details on the workings of the goal. Lastly, we visited the cemetery which has over 40 thousand graves of which most are unmarked. Because of the number of graves Silverton is still considered a city.

### **DAY 10**

Tuesday we left Broken Hill for Wentworth and spent most of the day travelling in rain. After happy hour we retired for the night.

### **DAY 11**

Wed we went for a drive to the junction of the Darling and Murray rivers and then onto Lock 10 at Wentworth. The Murray River was in flood with waters flowing over lock walls providing an amazing sight. We then went for a walk around shops in Wentworth and had lunch at the bakery. After lunch we travelled into Mildura and a walk around the city and the marina. We again had happy hour in Gay and Michaels caravan as the weather turned cool and started to rain which continued all night.

### **DAY 12**

Thursday we packed up in rain with our destination being Marong. We stopped for lunch at Sea Lake and started getting reports of flooding on the Calder Highway which altered our destination to St Arnaud. Raining since leaving Wentworth roads were starting to flood and therefore travel was slow having the navigate water over roads. We arrived at St Arnaud late afternoon and set up in rain.







Friday. We decided to stay an extra day at St Arnaud to let flood waters reside, the rain had stopped overnight, and the day was fine so we walked into town and went to the local Police Station to find out road conditions.
