The loss of the Camerons Bight agreement is being blamed as the cause for some leaving but I think age and health has a lot more to do with it.

We are unique in that we are the oldest caravan club in Australia. We had our own 'camp ground' unfortunately that is now gone from our control. We hold monthly rallies, run tag a long rallies and we have a large number of younger members and some with kids. Other clubs are not the same.

When I first stepped into this role, I set 3 objectives I thought were important for the future of our club. Grow the Club, Find a Camp Ground & Renew our agreement with Camerons Bight:

GROW THE CLUB

We have raised our presence on Social Media; we still have opportunities to grow this. We stood at caravan shows stands promoting our club, until CIV changed their ways. We had success. George Haig came to the rescue organising a stand, but there was no interest to support it, yes it was on a rally weekend.

We promoted our club at every opportunity on TV and in Radio interviews.

We have had some success, picking up new members. Div 4, 5 and 6 continue to grow thanks mostly to their committee's and their member's ongoing efforts. Div 1, 2 & 3 are declining.

FIND A CAMP GROUND

We held 2 Special General Meetings to seek direction and support on how to use the funds from the sale of Learmonth. The consensus was to acquire a camp ground. We have travelled lots and lots of kilometres spoken to many real estate agents, visited a number of different potential sites. Met and conversed with various Council representatives. I believe our requirements are reasonable; our budget is limited restricting our choices. Finding a suitable property in relative close proximity to attractions proved to be challenging. It all took a lot of time and consumed plenty of diesel.

We found one located in Glenrowan that ticks the boxes and in our budget. We met with Council's Planning, EPA & Economic Development Representatives, they appear to be supportive of us using it as a camp ground. We believe council will approve us building a shed, installing septic and camping on the property. All that needs to happen is for us to put in an offer with conditions and for an Special General Meetings to approve the purchase. This would not be our first camp ground; the last one we managed was very successful for the club and its members. This one presents some new opportunities for the club.

More on this a little later.

RENEW OUR AGREEMENT WITH CAMERONS BIGHT

Sandra warned me that this might not be possible but thanks to the support from the previous members of the Camerons Bight Committee we were successful in getting another agreement. Unfortunately that one ran its course and there was to be no more. State Govt changed their camping polices and changed the rules around caravan parks too. But we can still camp there. The foreshore committee are very happy to have us and are willing to work with our club with our activities. If we ask they will open for us during the off season.



MY EXIT

It has been a privilege and a honour to be President of this club, I am just a blink in its 87 year history we have some very passionate supporters in our club. Members who work hard to make rallies enjoyable, promote our club to grow it, all who work in the back ground. I thank you. Our club would not be what it is today without those people.

We have achieved many things since I took the chair.

- We sold Learmonth , not something I wanted.
- We investigated options and sought guidance from our members on how to use the Learmonth funds, this is still a work in progress.
- We enhanced our presence in social media. From this we gained some new members.
- We started Division 6. Division 4 became so big it could no longer fit into one Caravan Park. Some members came to us and asked if they could start a new division. Not everyone agreed to this but the alternative options had their own problems. Capping Div 4 or moving the extras to another division was not the solution.
- We survived COVID . Never did I ever dream that we would have to cancel so many rallies. Rules are rules and health is way more important.
- We zoomed AGM's SGMs and many committee meetings all from the comfort of our home or where ever. And you didn't have to wear pants.


Both Peter & Fran are held in the highest regard by Club Members as they have volunteered their time to many activities supporting our Club.


