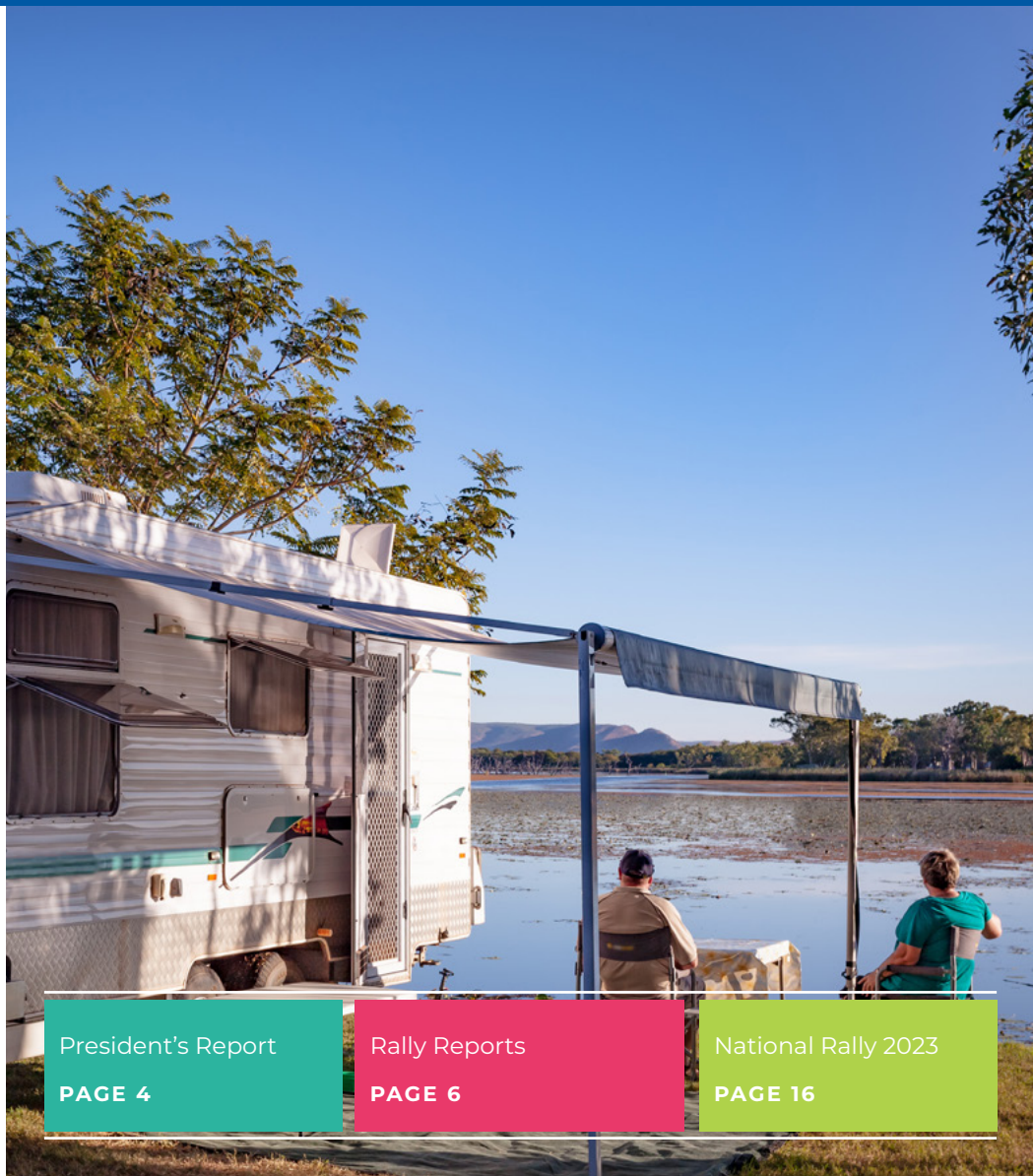

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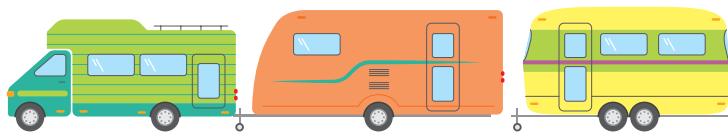

Things are going on, I will share what has been happening in the background.

CAMERONS BIGHT 2022/2023

For the second time in the clubs history the application for a camp site at Camerons Bight was not included in the newsletter. This time we were waiting on two things first the fees for the 2022/23 season. Secondly Max Patton, the Foreshore Manager had submitted a proposal to the WhiteCliffs Camerons Bight Committee for our club to continue to allocate sites for the off peak season.

On the 1st of May we were advised of the fees for the upcoming season an increase of 10% our discount ceased too. We were informed the increase was to cover the Fire management services, sewer connections and increased waste collection costs.

We were advised that there would be no changes to our MOU. DEWLP have been very clear about wanting camp grounds around Port Phillip Bay to be opened up and available to all in the community. The Committee are obligated to comply with DEWLPs requirements. Since this information was provided the WhiteCliffs to Camerons Bight Foreshore committee of management has changed.

If you wish to camp at Camerons Bight during the off peak season you will need to book through the WhiteCliffs to Camerons Bight Rangers office on line system from 2nd August noon. To book online or call:

LEARMONTH FUNDS

The Learmonth Sub-Committee have met. We have re branded the sub-committee to "The Campground Sub-Committee"

They are looking for a property, a minimum of 5 acres within close proximity to a largish town and as close to Melbourne as possible. Preferably with a house on the property. They have \$372,000 for the purchase of a property and payment of legal fees.

The Sub-Committee will assess any suitable property proposed which will include a site inspection and consultation with council to ascertain any restrictions on the properties use. If it is suitable it will be presented to the Executive committee to make a decision on presenting the property to a Special General Meeting.

Please if you come across a property that maybe suitable, pass the information on to us.

The Sub-Committee will be looking at options for campground management such as a host

manager, caretaker or committee to oversee the grounds, perhaps similar to the past Sorrento model and make its recommendations to the Executive in due course.

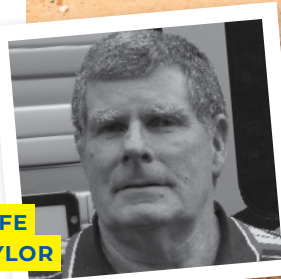

WODONGA

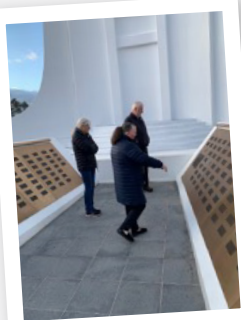
Saturday morning was left free for people to either relax or explore Wodonga. After lunch we head off to the Bandiana Army Museum. Bandiana is a Army logistics base in Wodonga, after being signed in at security we headed to the museum. The museum has the largest military collection in Australia and was very

interesting. The Museum was established in 1976 as the Royal Australian Army Ordnance



Corps (RAAOC) General Museum. The Museum building is itself unique, in that it is a WW2 era timber framed warehouse, with corrugated iron sheeting. It was constructed in 1940 and very few of these once prolific structures remain. The museum holds collections from groups such as Transport, Medical, Ordnance, Electrical & Mechanical Engineers and Catering Corps to name a few. The collection included items from the Boar War through to more recent times. There was a huge range of vehicles, canons, rifles, uniforms, medical and even a Russian T34 tank from WW2. Well worth the visit and filled in the afternoon. On the way back to the caravan park the Breese's and Burn's went to Huon Hill Lookout with a fantastic view out to the mountains.

Sunday after morning tea we headed off to the Hume Wier. The construction began in 1919 and continued during the Great Depression until the project was finished in 1936. At its peak, over 1000 tradesmen and labourers used steam engines, horse-drawn carts and manual labour to build the massive dam. When finished in 1936, Hume Dam was the biggest in the southern hemisphere and one of the largest in the world.



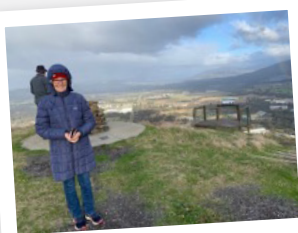
The dam is named after Hamilton Hume, the first European to explore the river upstream of Albury in 1824. Hume Dam holds a maximum of 3,005,156 megalitres, about six times the volume of Sydney Harbour. After walking across the dam wall, we decided to have lunch at the Boat Shed Lake Hume Resort, the room had a view over the lake and meals that were tasty.



After lunch we headed to the Bonegilla Migrant Experience. Bonegilla Migrant Reception and Training Centre was once made up of 24 blocks, each block holding about 300 people. It had its own churches, banks, sporting fields, cinema, hospital, police station and railway platform. Today, Block 19 is all that remains of the original site. The Bonegilla story began in the years following World War II, when millions of people seeking a new start and peace, departed for Australia. An army camp at Bonegilla was transformed into a migrant reception and training centre where new arrivals lived while they were processed



and allocated jobs. Bonegilla became the largest and longest operating reception centre in the post-war era.



More than 300,000 migrants passed through its doors between 1947 and 1971.

After walking around the camp we headed back to the caravan park and happy hour at 5pm.

Monday was another great day as we headed out for a drive to Rutherglen. We had a walk around town and the compulsory visit to the bakery for some tasty food. Bruce, raved about his Sweet Chilli Chicken and Prawn Pie which look delicious. After lunch

we headed to Pfeiffer's Winery, just a short drive from Rutherglen for some wine tasting. The winery has a large range of wines and a great venue to relax and have a chat. Following this we headed back to town for coffees then back to the caravan park. Some went via Albury and visited Monument Hill Parkland which had panoramic views and war memorial. Happy hour was back at the caravan park at 5pm which was enjoyable before retiring for the night.

The next morning, we all packed up and headed for home. Although the weather was a bit cool over the weekend the rain held off, all in all a great weekend.

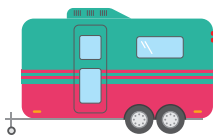
